


THERE'S STILL TIME! Registration closes October 31st

About the Tablature...

This month's tab is one of our Legacy Interviewee's favorite songs, the wellknown hymn, "*It Is Well with My Soul.*" The hymn was penned by hymnist Horatio G. Spafford and composed by Philip Bliss. It was first published in 1876 and is often taken as a choral model, appearing in hymnals of a wide variety of Christian fellowships.

Spafford was a Presbyterian layman from Chicago. He had established a very successful legal practice as a young businessman and was also a devout Christian. Among his close friends were several evangelists including the famous Dwight L. Moody, also from Chicago.

Spafford's fortune evaporated in the wake of the great Chicago Fire of 1871. Having invested heavily in real estate along Lake Michigan's shoreline, he lost everything overnight. In a saga reminiscent of Job, his son died a short time before his financial disaster. But the worst was yet to come.

Just a few years later in 1873, Horatio decided to treat his wife and four daughters to a much-needed escape from the turmoil. He sent them on a boat trip to Europe, with plans to join them shortly after wrapping up some business in Chicago. On November 22 the ship was struck by an English vessel and sank in twelve minutes. Several days later the survivors landed at Cardiff, Wales, and Mrs. Spafford cabled her husband, "Saved alone" – all four of his daughters had perished in the wreck.

Hymn composer, Philip Bliss was so moved by Horatio's prose, that he composed a peaceful tune to accompany the words.

The words of the hymn reflect Spafford's belief that even during great trials and sorrows, God is still with us, and everything will be alright in the end. The song has been a source of comfort for many people over the years, and it continues to be sung by both Christians and non-Christians alike.



2023 is the 150th anniversary of *It Is Well with My Soul*. Commemoration services are being planned to remember the actual day of the tragedy, Wednesday November 22, and a new edition of the book "*It Is Well with My Soul: From Tragedy to Trust*" has also been published in the anniversary year.

A big "Thank you!" to Ann Wilder (LaGrange Troupers) for her lovely arrangement of this hymn.

Dalton Dulcimers

The group enjoyed the Dog Days of Summer Mini Festival. It was great to be with other players and enjoy superb teaching by Jeff Furman and Stephen Seifert. Members learned much that will be incorporated into their playing.

The Dixieland Dulcimers have taken the summer off but stay tuned – you know they'll be back soon with some great news!




We're Back! NGFDA held its first live festival since 2019 the Dog Days of Summer Mini Fest

Did you attend the NGFDA **Dog Days of Summer Mini Fest**? If not, you missed a wonderful event! This was the first in-person festival that's been sponsored by NGFDA since its annual fall festival held at Unicoi State Park in Helen, GA in 2019. Prior to the Covid pandemic restricting large in-person events, NGFDA had located a new, affordable venue where the NGFDA Fall Festival could be held. Plans had been finalized to hold the organization's next

festival at the Baptist Conference Center in Toccoa. That planned festival was cancelled for 2020 because of the pandemic. The Baptist Conference Center has since been sold and is no longer available for special events. Although NGFDA's virtual festivals have been successful, members have longed to attend in-person events once again. The Dalton Dulcimers stepped forward to offer a venue in their town, the First Baptist Church. NGFDA members voted to support that venue and the **Dog Days of Summer Mini Fest** evolved. If you did not attend, you missed a great mountain dulcimer festival!





The First Baptist Church of Dalton is a beautiful and spacious venue! The 28 attendees at the **Dog Days of Summer Mini Fest** had the large church fellowship building to themselves. Talented guest instructors, Jeff Furman and Stephen Seifert, wowed the audience with their musical skills. They both performed a welcome concert on Friday night of the festival and their workshops took place the following day. Dulcimer students of all skill levels took classes with both instructors exploring new techniques and taking home new music. Learning from these two instructors was a special treat. Steve Seifert announced that he is scaling back on some of his training classes. And Jeff Furman



much prefers a hands-on teaching experience and refrains from teaching on-line.



NGFDA President Mike VanDemark, along with church leaders and representatives from Dalton Dulcimers, coordinated and provided oversight for the festival. Morning and afternoon snacks were provided, as well as a delicious, catered lunch. Participants' comments were complimentary; students departed smiling and happy to be playing once again at a live venue. Many inquiries were heard about where future festivals will be held. Some attendees mentioned that they were uncomfortable with virtual events and that they much prefer live workshops. One person said that her workplace held so many on-line meetings and training and that she'd grown weary of them. As a beginner player, she was thrilled to attend the **Dog Days of Summer Mini Fest** and was hoping that there would be more live events in the future.



Legacy Interview – Frank & Jeanne Gibbs



How did you get started playing the dulcimer?

Frank: I went to Hiawassee to the Mountain Music Festival in 1995 and there were two ladies playing mountain dulcimers. I told Jeanne that I was going to learn how to play that instrument. It was beautiful. I bought a toy dulcimer at the festival made from pine shelving board and fishing string for \$15. The vendor gave me two songs: *Mary Had a Little Lamb* and *Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star.* I returned home and drove Jeanne crazy playing them. Jeanne told me that if I was going to keep playing that I needed to get a dulcimer and be serious about it. In 1996, I built my first dulcimer over about a 6-month period. I started playing it, joined the Middle Georgia Dulcimer Club and became an active member.

Jeanne: I started playing mountain dulcimer around 2004. I have played many instruments before and thought I would like the dulcimer. I tried it and fell in love with it. I started going to festivals with Frank and joined the Middle Georgia Dulcimer Club.

Is your family musical?

Frank: My mother was a piano teacher and taught piano for 75 years. My brother played the guitar. **Jeanne:** I had an aunt that played the autoharp and lap harp. Both of my parents sang in church choirs. My mother played the piano.

Do you play any other instruments?

Frank: I play the autoharp in addition to the mountain dulcimer.

Jeanne: I have played the piano, mountain dulcimer, guitar, psaltry, autoharp, and floor harp. My favorite by far is the large floor harp.

Do you read music or play by ear?

Frank: I play by ear. I don't know "squat" about reading music. I play mountain dulcimer by tablature. **Jeanne:** I read music very, very well and am excellent at proper timing. Sometimes I add harmony and chords.

What is your favorite song?

Frank: *The Lighthouse, Can I Have This Dance.* **Jeanne:** *To God Be the Glory, It Is Well With My Soul.*

Who would you like to play a duet with?

Frank: My wife, Jeanne. **Jeanne:** With anyone who is willing to play. I love to play duets.

Have you taught the dulcimer to others?

Frank: Not in a teaching capacity but have helped many beginning players and dulcimer friends with reading tab, timing, and picking out songs.

Jeanne: I was the director of the Middle Georgia Dulcimer Club for many years. I was blessed with the ability to read music and correct timing. Many players have benefitted from my talents in being able to teach them.

What advice would you give to a beginning dulcimer player?

Frank: Get a good instrument, get some beginner books, find a mentor or a club, and start playing with them. Practice, practice, practice.

Jeanne: Practice some every day and play what you enjoy.

What else do you do when you're not playing the dulcimer?

Frank: Grandchildren, training service dogs for disabled veterans, woodworking, mechanics, old tractors. **Jeanne:** Grandchildren, playing harp, Bible study, Zoom meetings with Christian friends.
